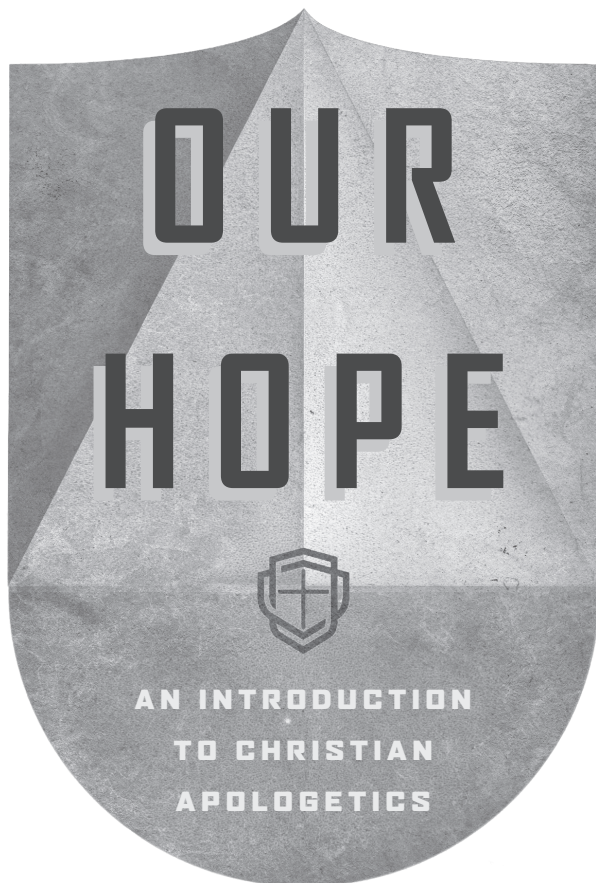

PREFACE



APOLOGETICS, RIGHTLY UNDERSTOOD, is closer to the heart of everyday Christian life than most people imagine, and deeper in its roots than many expect. There is no shortage of books on the subject. Many of them are technical manuals, focused on arguments and methods, that teach you how to win a debate but leave you without a theological foundation. Others are more relational in spirit but lack the doctrinal moorings that give apologetics its substance and staying power. What is harder to find is a book that takes Christian dogmatics seriously as the basis for apologetic engagement and then shows ordinary believers how to share the hope they have in Christ. That is what I attempt to do in this book.

Much of what shaped this book was not learned in a classroom. It was learned at Fred's Diner.

While serving as a pastor in Grayslake, Illinois, I made Fred's a regular stop. I was known there as "Preacher Man." And over time, that nickname opened doors that a more formal approach never would have. I developed friendships with many people outside of my church. I listened to their troubles. I shared meals and opinions and small talk. And when the weight of life came down on them—when a parent died, or a marriage fell apart, or a job disappeared—they would find me at the counter or in a booth, and they were ready to talk in a way they never had before. The trust we had built made that possible. I was not a pastor behind a desk or a stranger pressing a tract into their hands. I was someone they knew, someone who had sat with them through ordinary days. They witnessed my hope, and when their own lives felt hopeless, they wanted to know the reason for mine.

I was not there for a quick win. I was not looking for a debate. Paul reminds us that the cross is already "a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles" (1 Cor. 1:23). We do not need to add to that offense by how we carry ourselves.

We honor Christ not only by proclaiming the truth but by speaking it in love (Eph. 4:15). What I discovered at Fred's was that the patient and relational long game created the kind of trust that could bear the weight of hard things.

That, in miniature, is what this book is about.

Peter's call in 1 Peter 3:15 is not addressed to philosophers or professional theologians. It is addressed to ordinary believers living under pressure, who need to be ready to make a defense for the reason for the hope within them, and to do so with gentleness and respect. The hope Peter has in mind is not vague optimism. It is the living hope grounded in the history of Christ's death and resurrection, and in his promised return, when those who are his will be raised with him. That is a fact that must be known, defended, and shared.

What follows is an introduction to that defense. It is rooted in the Reformed, presuppositional approach to apologetics developed by Cornelius Van Til, but it is written for the person who has never heard that name. What matters is not the label but the posture: beginning with God, thinking through his word, and engaging the world with both conviction and compassion.

I hope you find it useful not merely as a study, but as preparation for the conversations that are already waiting for you.

FOUNDATIONS OF HOPE

Understanding Apologetics



THIS BOOK IS AN INVITATION to explore the vital discipline of Christian apologetics—the art and practice of defending and explaining our faith. The term *apologetics* comes from the Greek word ἀπολογία (*apologia*), meaning “defense.” While God’s truth stands firm regardless of our arguments, he has entrusted us with the privileged task of articulating and defending the hope we have in Christ.

At the heart of this calling lies the exhortation from the apostle Peter: “But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense (ἀπολογίαν, *apologian*) to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect” (1 Pet. 3:15). This verse reveals that apologetics is fundamentally about defending the reason for our hope—not abstract philosophical concepts, but the living hope we have through Christ’s resurrection (1:3).

This focus on hope transforms apologetics from an intellectual exercise into something much more personal. Every believer can speak to the hope that sustains them through all the challenges of life as well as its triumphs. This hope is not wishful thinking but is anchored in the historical reality of Christ’s resurrection and its ongoing impact in our lives.

When we defend the reason for this hope, we are not merely arguing for theological propositions but bearing witness to the transformative power of the gospel. We speak from personal experience of how this hope has changed us—bringing peace amid chaos, purpose in confusion, and joy in suffering. This makes apologetics accessible to all believers, regardless of educational background or theological expertise. A grandmother can share how this

hope sustained her through losing a spouse; a teenager can explain how it gives meaning beyond what we can see.

The emphasis on hope also shapes our approach. We engage others not as opponents to be defeated but as fellow image-bearers who need the same hope we have found in Christ. This fosters the gentleness and respect Peter commands, as we seek not to win arguments but to share the source of our hope—the resurrected Christ who offers new life to all who believe.

Throughout these pages, we will explore the foundational principles and practical techniques of apologetics. My goal is to equip you, regardless of your background or expertise, to engage in meaningful conversations about your faith. If the thought of defending your hope seems daunting, take heart. Apologetics is not reserved for scholars or theologians; it is a calling for every believer.

Many of us feel intimidated by the prospect of apologetics because we have misconceptions about what constitutes a proper defense. Let me reassure you: A sincere apologetic can be as straightforward as proclaiming, “Christ died and was raised for my salvation.” The power of our defense lies not in our eloquence or intellect but in the truth of the message and the work of the Holy Spirit. As followers of Christ, we are each called to

1. Present a reasoned defense of our faith;
2. Be prepared to engage with anyone who inquires; and
3. Communicate the grounds of our hope.

In this book, I aim to demystify apologetics and provide you with the tools to fulfill this calling. We will explore how apologetics strengthens our own faith, equips us to engage with unbelievers, and prepares us to confront challenges to our beliefs. Moreover, we will see how apologetics plays a crucial role in our personal growth, compelling us to think biblically (2 Cor. 10:5).

Remember, the effectiveness of our defense does not rest on our abilities. Even the simplest defense, when offered faithfully and respectfully, can be used powerfully by the Lord to draw others to him. Let us approach this task with confidence, humility, and an unwavering commitment to honor Christ in all we say and do.

THE BENEFIT OF APOLOGETICS

Just in case you are not already motivated to get out and defend your hope, allow me to share three compelling reasons why apologetics can benefit you and your conversation partners:

1. **Strengthening Faith:** Apologetics deepens your understanding of the faith, reinforcing the reasons why you believe. It is like the roots of a tree—the deeper they go, the stronger the tree stands.
2. **Engaging People in Need:** In our lives, we meet many people seeking truth. Apologetics equips us to engage meaningfully with their questions and doubts, offering them the hope that we have in Christ.
3. **Confronting Challenges:** Our faith is increasingly challenged by diverse worldviews. Apologetics prepares us to respond thoughtfully and respectfully to these challenges, standing firm in our convictions.

Apologetics serves as a valuable tool not only for fortifying your faith but also for addressing those remnants of the old man (Eph. 4:22) that persist within us. There are aspects of unbelief within each of us. Through apologetics, we can identify and challenge the flesh. Our sanctification must extend beyond our actions to our very thoughts, compelling us to bring every thought into obedience to Christ (2 Cor. 10:5). This reflects the admonition in Romans 12:1–2, which urges us to be transformed by the renewing of our minds and to offer ourselves as living sacrifices. Thus, apologetics is utterly practical. Its value is not limited to our engagements with critics of Christianity; it also enriches our familial ties, nurtures the bonds with our children, strengthens friendships, supports church relationships, and fosters personal growth.

Apologetics is about defending the faith. When you hear the word *faith*, I suspect you probably think about it in a *subjective* sense—as in *your* faith, that in which you believe. That is certainly important. To be saved, we must know the truth of Jesus Christ, agree that those truth claims are correct, and then trust in Christ for salvation.¹ This is essential for eternal life. But the

¹ Theologians often describe saving faith as having three essential components: (1) knowledge, (2) assent, and (3) trust. To illustrate these aspects, consider the analogy of an office chair:

- Knowledge (*notitia*): You know the manufacturer claims the chair can safely support 300 lbs. This is like knowing the content of the gospel—that Jesus Christ died and rose again for sinners.

Bible also speaks about faith in an *objective* sense, as in defending *the* faith. Jude wrote, “Beloved, although I was very eager to write to you about our common salvation, I found it necessary to write appealing to you to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints” (Jude 3). The Christian faith is revealed in holy Scripture. In accord with it, we bear witness to the life, death, resurrection, ascension, and session of Christ crucified and raised for sinners.

Apologetics engages with doubts and objections to faith (in both the objective and subjective senses), addressing challenges from skeptics as well as the lingering uncertainties within ourselves. It is not just a defensive measure; it serves as an active dismantling of arguments against divine truth. In 2 Corinthians 10:5, Paul speaks of demolishing every argument that stands against the knowledge of God, taking captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ. Apologetics proactively confronts objections, blazing a trail toward understanding and faith. When we practice apologetics with humility, gentleness, and respect, we often find that the Lord blesses our efforts, using them to draw others to Christ—particularly in our personal relationships.

In our world today, the need for apologetics is more pronounced than ever. We live in an age of information, where ideas about truth, morality, and spirituality collide from every direction. People are searching for answers that make sense of their lives and the world around them. As Christians, we have those answers, rooted in divine revelation and the historical truth of the gospel.

But it is not just about having the right answers; it is about engaging with others in a way that reflects Christ’s love and grace. Apologetics is as much about the heart as it is about the mind. It is about listening, understanding, and responding with respect and compassion while remaining uncompromisingly faithful to God’s word.

-
- Assent (*assensus*): You agree that the manufacturer’s claim is true. Similarly, you might intellectually accept that the gospel message is factual.
 - Trust (*fiducia*): You actually sit in the chair, fully resting your weight on it. This corresponds to relying on Christ alone for your salvation.

Just as knowing about the chair’s capacity and believing it is true is not the same as sitting in it, intellectual knowledge and agreement about the gospel are not sufficient for saving faith. True saving faith requires all three elements: knowing the gospel message, believing it to be true, and personally trusting in Christ for salvation. Saving faith goes beyond mere knowledge or intellectual assent—it involves receiving and resting upon Christ alone for your salvation.

While our goal is to guide others to a saving knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ, success is not measured by the number of people convinced. Rather, the true measure lies in our dedication to presenting a cogent and faithful explanation for the hope we bear. This faithfulness to Christ is the heart of apologetics—it is not merely about winning arguments, but about witnessing with integrity to our Savior. Our goal is to present the reasons for our hope thoughtfully, engaging with genuine inquirers and addressing opposition with boldness and love. As we explore apologetics, remember: Our task is to present our defense faithfully, with humility and wisdom, while entrusting the results to God.

We will dive deeper into the unique characteristics of Reformed apologetics, understanding how it grounds us in Scripture and the sovereignty of God. But for now, remember that apologetics is not just for pastors, scholars, or theologians. It is for every one of us, every day, in every conversation. It is about being ready to give an answer to anyone who asks about the hope that we have and doing so with gentleness and respect.

A DISTINCTLY REFORMED APOLOGETIC

There are many different forms of apologetics, and there are many terms we can use for the type of approach to defending the faith that I am presenting. In this book, I will predominantly use the term *Reformed apologetics*. By Reformed, I am referring to the historic creeds and confessions which summarize the theological tradition arising from the Protestant Reformation. I believe the Reformed tradition most accurately expresses the teaching of Scripture. Personally, I do not distinguish Reformed from Christian apologetics because I believe Reformed apologetics is the most biblically faithful and consistent form of Christian apologetics. Still, there are always variations among different theologians that we could discuss. But my intent now is for us to take our marching orders straight from the source, the word of God. And I believe the Reformed tradition orients us toward that end.

Historians typically recognize the Protestant Reformation beginning in 1517 when Martin Luther nailed his Ninety-Five Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. This was close to a millennium and a half after Peter wrote about making a defense for the hope within us and when Jude called the church to contend for the faith once for all delivered to

the saints. Though there is a great difference in time, I do not believe the Reformed faith is anything different from historic Christian orthodoxy.

Between the apostolic era and the sixteenth century, much happened. By the time of the Protestant Reformation, it was clear the church had drifted far from the teaching of Scripture. Luther addressed the doctrine of justification while Calvin focused on the reformation of worship. Orthodoxy was recovered and refined. But the spirit of the Reformation lives on. Christians must continually seek to be reformed according to Scripture.

This ongoing reformation is not merely about addressing external practices or peripheral doctrinal formulations. To be equipped to defend the faith adequately, we must penetrate to the bedrock so that we may build upon a proper theological foundation. We may highlight three aspects of this foundation:

1. **Scripture as the Ultimate Authority:** At the heart of Reformed apologetics is the conviction that the Bible is the ultimate authority in all matters of faith and life. It is not just one source among others; it is the standard against which all ideas and arguments are measured.
2. **The Sovereignty of God:** Reformed apologetics underscores the belief in a God who is sovereign over all. This means our defense of the faith is not just about winning arguments but about bearing witness to the truth of a God who rules and reigns over every aspect of our lives and the world.
3. **The Divine Covenants:** A Reformed approach to apologetics properly views all of reality through the lens of God's covenantal relationship with his people. It acknowledges that everything connects in God's grand narrative of creation, fall, redemption, and consummation.

In this book, we will consider the fundamental doctrines that comprise this bedrock: the doctrine of God and his revelation, the doctrine of the image of God, the covenant of works, the fall into sin, the antithesis between believers and unbelievers, the doctrine of common grace, and the work of the Holy Spirit to renew us in the image of the resurrected Christ. If we understand these biblical doctrines, we will be able to build properly. But I also have an additional motive. I believe that when we understand these doctrines at a fundamental level, an apologetic method arises. This may be

surprising to you. Many people think of apologetic methods as a matter of personal preference. In other words, so long as you end up in the right place, it does not matter so much how we got there. I think this shortchanges the word of God. While there may be different *styles* of presentation, I am convinced that the Bible presents a specific apologetic method.

Oddly enough, even confessionally Reformed theologians who hold to these basic doctrines will leave them at the door when they enter someone's house for an apologetic encounter. Some opt for classical or evidentialist approaches and, in turn, place the word of God off to the side in order to make what they believe is a more persuasive argument. There is much to be said for the classical proofs for the existence of God or appealing to evidence of God's works in history; however, these only make sense in light of the fullness of God's revelation and specifically, his special revelation in Scripture. Apologists should lead with Scripture, not treat it as a liability. The faithful apologist must not "apologize" for what God says. They are the words of life.

Cornelius Van Til (1895–1987) was a key figure in the development of a distinctly Reformed apologetic. He did not just defend the faith; he changed how we think about it. He introduced what is known as the "presuppositional"² approach, which asserts that everyone has basic beliefs that shape their understanding of the world—their presuppositions. He argued that only the Christian worldview provides a coherent and rational basis for understanding reality. At root, Van Til proposes an indirect approach to apologetics. Rather than treating our conversation partner as an independent judge capable of evaluating evidence and rational arguments on their own, Van Til argued that we cannot know anything at all without first standing on the foundation of the self-existent, independent, and transcendent triune God. Because of that, we must adopt a transcendental approach to apologetics, demonstrating the necessary preconditions for the world to exist in the way it does. Only the triune God, revealed in Scripture, satisfies those necessary preconditions.

Imagine building a house. The foundation is the most crucial part. In a similar way, Van Til taught that our fundamental beliefs about the world are like the foundation of our thinking. If the foundation is flawed, the entire structure is

² Van Til did not introduce this term, but his approach came to be known by this title. J. Oliver Buswell spoke of Van Til's apologetic method as "presuppositionism." Over time, the theological community settled on "presuppositionalism" or "presuppositional apologetics."

unstable. Reformed apologetics, then, seeks to engage not just at the level of individual arguments but at the foundational level of presuppositions.

Now, this may sound new and innovative, and to a large degree, it was in the 1930s and 40s when Van Til was introducing these ideas. But I do not want you to see Cornelius Van Til as an *innovator* so much as a thorough and consistent *applicator* of Reformed and biblical theological principles to the practice of defending the faith.

As we move forward, remember that Reformed apologetics is not just about defending a set of doctrines; it is about inviting others to see the world through the lens of Scripture, to understand the sovereignty of God, and to recognize the coherence and beauty of the Christian worldview. It is a call to think deeply, engage meaningfully, and bear witness faithfully to the truth that is in Jesus, the only foundation that bears the weight of reality.

I pray that in these pages, you will find not only answers to common objections but also a deeper understanding of the robust, intellectually satisfying nature of the Christian faith. You will see how the hope of the resurrection, as proclaimed in 1 Peter 1:3, is the cornerstone of our assurance and the ultimate answer to the questions of life and death. In this book, I aim to equip you with the theological foundation and tools needed to engage thoughtfully and respectfully with those who question or challenge your beliefs.

As you work through these chapters, you will be encouraged to see that apologetics is not merely for scholars but for every believer who desires to represent Christ faithfully in an unbelieving world. Each chapter is designed to build your understanding and provide practical insights into defending the reason for your hope with gentleness and respect, as Peter exhorts us to do. So, whether you are a seasoned apologist looking to refine your approach or someone just beginning to explore the reasons for your faith, this book is for you.
